I take words and direction well from others. Knowing this, I need your help this coming year for our Bible Studies. The Women's Bible Study is going strong, and has their program worked out and in place. Men, we took a break last year and we need to meet again. Sunday mornings, we should be full. In past years, we have started strong and then dwindled. We need to be strong and going throughout the year.

So, what do we want to study? New Testament or Old? A book of the Bible or a topic? For Sunday mornings, I have found Several studies I would like to go through with you. Concordia Publishing House has just put out a brand new curriculum entitled "A Journey through Church History." It offers both a student and leader book and goes through the personalities, controversies, and blessings of church history. There would be a nominal cost of \$20 for the student book.

Another possibility is a book by Andy Wright, "Faithfully Formed: The Lutheran Confessions in Daily Life." This will look at how to take your Lutheran faith and apply it to your daily life. This book covers many different contemporary topics and comes with discussion questions for personal thought and group discussion. The cost for this book through CPH is just \$18.

Do you want to dive deep into scripture? We can tackle one of the 66 books in the Bible. "God's Word for Today: Psalms" is available from CPH for \$12. Each of the 150 psalms has a story and a meaning behind it. The format is much less sequential than some of the other studies. Each session would be full of something new and someone missing one to two weeks would not end in confusion.

If you have other ideas, please let me know. I want to be in centerfield with all of you, I want to see you in Bible Study and to learn and grow with you into a deeper love and relationship with Jesus Christ and with each other.

I also hear some requests for an evening Men's Bible Study. I would love this! We only need to know who would like to come and what evenings would work with your schedules. So much of our schedule here is during the day or early evening when some have difficulty attending, and this would be a great addition to our program.

If the cost of Bible study materials is a barrier to you, do not hesitate call the church office, we will happily provide the book for you. I am looking forward to a great year of growing in Christ together!

to 6 pm. The menu includes grilled ribeye steak, baked potato, green beans, salad, Italian bread, dessert, and drink for \$25. An additional steak is \$10. Carry-outs are available. Ticket sales will begin and volunteer and dessert signup sheets will be in the hallway **Aug. 19**. Please consider taking a block of tickets to sell to family, friends, and / or co-workers. We'll need lots of help with set up, during the event, and take down afterwards. *This event has advance ticket sales only – they will not be sold at the door.*

GIFT (SCRIP) CARDS ORDERS: The next Scrip order is due to the church office by 9 am on Monday, Aug. 12. Updated order blanks are on the table in the chapel hallway; please use these for your orders and throw away old order blanks. Orders are not limited to the vendors listed on the order blank; if you want to order a vendor not listed, first see if it is available through this program by looking it up on the internet or looking at the listing posted on the chapel bulletin board. The following have been added to the vendor list: McDonald's with a 2% profit to the church, Casev's Gas with a 3% profit to the church, Jimmie John's Subs with an 8% profit to the church, and Sonic (when it opens) with an 8% profit to the church. You can find a complete list of vendors online at www.raiseright.com/resources/organization or on the bulletin board in the hall. If your vendor is available write the name of the vendor, denomination of the gift card, number of cards wanted, and total amount on a blank line of the order form. Orders will be available on Aug. 18, in the church office after that, or you can make special arrangements with Jo Van Hoveln. If you have questions, please see Jo Van Hoveln or Kim Davis.

SCRIP CARD EXPLANATION: The cards come in various amounts and can be used just like a credit/debit card at the designated vendor. For example, you order and get a \$100 Meijer card. The church gets \$3 (3%) of income from this card, and you buy \$100 worth of groceries, prescriptions, gas, etc. with it. There are varying rates on these cards from 1.5% to 13% so the amount the church receives depends on the rate on the individual vendor card. There is a printed list of the vendors and the percentages they give on the bulletin board in the chapel hallway and also on their website at www.raiseright.com/resources/organization. These cards are good anywhere in the USA and make great birthday, Christmas, new baby, or wedding gifts.

CAPITAL FUND DRIVE: The current bank balance is \$22,706 and a Certificate of Deposit for \$20,000. resealing of the north part of the parking lot and a couple of other areas has not been paid for yet. This leaves us with about \$38,800 for our new project (see details under new project heading). The congregation established the Capital Fund Drive in 2012, and thanks to our generous congregation, we have accomplished many needed upgrades and renovations. Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school and church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own household's. There is a Capital Fund Drive bulletin board in the hallway between the coat room and the parish mailboxes. There, you'll find special envelopes for Capital Fund donations. "...because of my devotion to the house of my God I give my treasure for the house of my God. 1 Chronicles 29:3b. All donations from large to small are equally appreciated. If you have any questions, please contact Jo Van Hoveln or any of the committee members.

ROOF DRIVE: Sentry Roofing put a Duro-Last Membrane roof on the school wing in 1996 which is just about shot. We have had to make many leak repairs, and water is pooling everywhere on the roof. After some areas were resealed, we can get about 2 more years out of the present roof, at the most. The gym roof of approximately 7,200 square feet is in better shape than the school roof. The gym roof has 2 layers while the rest has 1 layer. The preliminary Sentry quote to reroof gym is \$72,240 which will put thicker layer on it. Reroofing the lower school roof would be \$166,960. If we do both at the same time, the total cost would be discounted \$7,000. There is an option for another layer of insulation on the school roof for \$26,740. If we do all the above, the total cost will be \$258,940. The skylights would also need to be redone. The Capital Fund Committee is making this our next project with help from the Board of Directors and/or church auxiliary organizations. The fundraising will take a couple of years to get the dollars needed. THIS PROJECT WILL NOT BE SCHEDULED UNTIL ALL THE MONEY IS IN THE CAPITAL **FUND ACCOUNT.** There is a display in the narthex just to the north of the sanctuary doors; please stop by and look at it. The display shows the deterioration of the roof surfaces and a fundraising thermometer which will show our progress towards the goal of \$260,000. There are also special envelopes on the table for donations. If you have any questions, please ask Scott Huckstadt, Jo Van Hoveln, other committee members, or members of the Board of Directors.

WOODEN BOWLS: Gail Garner has graciously volunteered to make various size wooden bowls as an additional fundraiser for the Capital Fund Drive. They are made from the library shelves of the school. They would make a good keepsake for former students and/or parents of students. A display will be put up in the church narthex soon. If you want to special order a set of them, please talk directly to Gail.

WOMEN'S GUILD NEWS:

 A summer lunch outing and shopping in Hoopeston was enjoyed by 16 ladies.



- Regular lunch meetings and a LWML CID Fall Rally in Loda are coming up in September.
- The Guild Board will meet Thursday, **Aug. 15** at 9 am to plan for the year.
- This year (January July), our congregation alone has collected \$497.00 in mites they really do add up! The LWML CID Mission Grant #1 for August 2024 is \$30,000 for student aid for church workers. Due to the high cost of becoming a full time church worker, many students find it difficult to complete their schooling. This grant will provide partial funding to CID students so they may realize their dreams of becoming full time church workers. These funds would be distributed through the LCMS CID Scholarship Committee.
- *Ingathering:* We have had many school families express interest in attending church services twice per month! In order to help them feel welcome, as well as help out our young member families, we will be collecting supplies to create a "Family Care Center" in the narthex. These items will hopefully aid them with caring for their children during services and send the message that they belong here! There is a tote in the coat room for your donations. Mercy and Grace Lead to Generosity

Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift" (2 Cor. 9:15)! This is St. Paul's exclamation upon hearing the Corinthian church's response to the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and his request for support for the church in Jerusalem. The Christians in Corinth heard and received God's mercy in Christ, and they responded to St. Paul's call to support Christians in Jerusalem with a collection. The Corinthians' joy filled Jerusalem's need. This is the reality of stewardship. Because of God's generosity in the giving of His Son to die on the cross for us, we are to be generous with all that we receive from Him. What do we receive? Everything. All that we are and all that we have is the Lord's. He is the creator and the giver. We are His creatures and those who receive what He gives. It sounds easy. And it is. But then again it isn't. Stewardship is easy because it is God's work. Through what God gives, we give to others. Through what God gives, we support the work of the church for the life of the world. He gives; we receive. And like our generous Father in Heaven, we, as His children, use what He gives to us to love and serve others. But stewardship is also difficult. That is because it goes against our natural inclination to think that what I have is mine to do what I want with. This is our sinful nature. It is our selfishness and our greed. How can we who have been given everything — life, food, clothing, house, home, forgiveness, divine sonship, an eternal inheritance — be so stingy with what we give to the church, the place where we hear about and receive all that God gives us and does for us? We are all guilty of this kind of thinking. And the only godly response is to repent and trust in the Gos-pel. For if God has given you His own Son, will He not give you all things? Yes. He will. This is His sure and certain promise. God provides for His people. He provides everything we need for this body and life and for the life that is to come.

New Youth Devotional Series: The youth will begin each Youth Night with a Bible Study. We are beginning a DVD series called Revolution. The world says to live for today. Jesus declares we can live forever. The world insists we look out for ourselves. Jesus answers with encouragement to love others. The world stresses a lonely life. Jesus points to a life full of purpose. As we follow Christ, we experience a transformation that changes everything. There are 5 episodes in this series:

- 1. Guilt: If life is full of regrets, then most of us are carrying a heavy load of guilt. Guilt for things we have done or said. Guilt for things we should have done, but didn't. Is guilt a bad thing? How do you get rid of it?
- 2. Worry: It starts with the fear of the unknown. You don't know what's going to happen. It's beyond your control. You're anxious, stressed, and worried. You may even feel depressed. What are you going to do?
- 3. **Anger:** At first you deny it. "I'm not mad, I'm just upset." The reality is that you are furious. You want to lash out or you stuff it down until you are sick with resentment. Why are you angry? How should you handle your anger?
- 4. **Doubt:** When your life is out of control, the questions can be overwhelming. Does God really care about me? Why does God allow bad things to happen? Is God even there? Is it wrong for Christians to have doubts?
- 5. **Impact:** It's a desperate world. There are lonely students in your school. Families need help in our community. War has left millions homeless overseas. Is there anything we can do? Can a teen really make a difference?

August Meetings: Our first Youth Night is coming up on **Aug. 1**. We'll watch our first episode



of the Revolution series and enjoy a fun activity! Then, our 2nd Youth Night in August will be **Saturday, Aug. 17** where we will finally get to have a fun night of Putt Putt Golf! We'll meet out at Illini Skateland at 6 pm – the cost is just \$5 per person. Families are

invited! We're going to have a GREAT time – no ifs, ands, or putts about it!



[Jesus said] "If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away. For it is better that you lose one of your members than that your whole body be thrown into hell." Matthew 5:29

Jesus isn't teaching us how to maim ourselves into heaven with these words. But neither is he just trying to reveal our inability or unwillingness to truly repent. What he IS doing is teaching us about prudence, discipline, and self-control for the sake of our eternal salvation. A wise Christian recognizes that there are particular people, places, and things that are prone to lead him into sin, AND he knows that if he would curb their influence, he ought to avoid them. So, for example, someone who is given to Drink, should avoid bars or people that make him want to drink. Someone who is a glutton should avoid going to buffet restaurants. It's a matter of "cutting out" of your life anything that you know leads to sin — regardless of how otherwise neutral or even good it is, such as an eye or a hand. This is the wisdom of God's law applied, particularly in its curbing use. With these words from the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus is giving us practical advice — not to save ourselves, but to keep us safe from spiritual harm, and like all gifts from him, we ought to receive it in good faith and with thanksgiving.



You don't have to visit the beach to make a sandcastle. Make fluffy "moon sand" to build fun structures.


What you need:






