

THE WORD BECAME FLESH

The incarnation is an event that we do not think of enough. Perhaps we do not think about it because we cannot ponder it too deeply even though it is an important part of the story that we cannot comprehend by our own reason or senses. This is why the world focuses on earthly things at Christmas. Why we focus on the Holy Family, Roman census and taxation, the shepherds and all the things found even in the secular Christmas specials. What is left out are the things pondered in the ancient hymns, such as "Savior of the Nations, Come" in its lyrics "Then stepped down the Lord of All" and later on "God of God becoming man." The limits of our ability to comprehend the divine within the Christmas story is why we love the Christmas narratives of Matthew and especially Luke, yet ignore the more theological proclamation in John which inspired the title of this article "and the word became flesh and dwelt among us". We focus on the miracle of Birth, for it is familiar to us. We all have been born, and many of us had had children, grandchildren, and even great grandchildren or if not perhaps nieces, nephews, and the like. It has been my honor in ministry to serve birthing centers, labor and delivery units, and even NICUs. Through this I have come to know where babies come from, and how they develop in the womb of their mothers. Birth is miraculous and yet birth is common so we can comprehend it. We can understand the birth of a baby. The incarnation is more difficult. It involves the infinite becoming finite; the unchanging God changing. Perhaps most confusing of all is the virgin birth. The all-powerful and Almighty second person of the Trinity hangs up his glory and not only enters into His own creation, but becomes a part of it as Jesus becomes man taking on our nature and becoming a physical being. This is not just for a time, but for eternity ads Revelation shows us. Jesus integrates humanity into His nature, becoming fully human and being conceived as a Zygote inside the womb of the Virgin Mary. A miraculous conception. Jesus is conceived by the Holy Spirit so that He is, unlike us, conceived and born sinless, not inheriting the original sin of Adam and Eve as we all do. God, Himself, steps down to rescue His creation after it, we, have rebelled and sinned against Him bringing damnation upon ourselves. This is the miracle of Christmas. This is what shows the great love and the great gift of God. It is not found in angels the shepherds or the flocks of sheep beneath the starlit skies. The love of Christmas is in God of God becoming man. From the word that spoke into the darkness and creating the great light entering into His creation in order to rescue, redeem, and ransom the whole world from sin and from the power of the devil through His cross on Calvary. May we this Christmas focus on this, the miracle of God's love, shown to us in His incarnate son, the babe of Bethlehem, Jesus Christ our Lord. AMEN.

Afterward, they explained to their son the joy that people experience from receiving — and opening — their own presents. Morals of the story? Remember this 3-year-old when you get overeager for certain parts of the holidays. Don't rush through anything, and let others enjoy Christmas at their own pace too. GIFT (SCRIP) CARDS ORDERS: The next Scrip order is due to the church office on Monday, Dec. 9 by 9 am. Scrip cards make great gifts! Updated order blanks are on the table in the chapel hallway. Orders are not limited to the vendors listed on the order blank. You can find a complete list of vendors at www.raiseright.com or on the bulletin board in the hall. Write the name of the vendor, denomination of the gift card, number of cards wanted, and total amount on a blank line. Orders will be available on Dec. 15. What is Scrip? They are gift cards. If you order and pay for a \$100 Meijer scrip card, you get a \$100 Meijer gift card. The church gets \$3 (3%) from the program, and you buy \$100 worth of groceries, prescriptions, gas, etc. with it. There are varying rates depending on the vendor ranging from 1.5% to 13%. These cards are good anywhere and make great birthday, Christmas, new baby, or wedding gifts.

CAPITAL FUND DRIVE: The current bank balance is \$1,321 with \$65,000 in Certificates of Deposit making our total monetary balance \$66,321. The congregation established the Capital Fund Drive in 2012, and thanks to our generous congregation, we have accomplished many

needed upgrades and renovations. There is a Capital Fund Drive bulletin board in the hallway between the coat room and mailboxes with envelopes for ongoing donations throughout the year. "...because of my devotion to the house of my God I give my treasure for the house of my God. 1 Chronicles 29:3b. Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would

our own households. All donations from large to small are equally appreciated. Questions? Please contact Jo Van Hoveln or any of the committee members.

PROJECTS COMPLETED: Thanks be to God the Father for His wonderful gift to us of His Son, Jesus. The following has been accomplished through the generous giving of our congregation! Without these generous gifts of time, talents, and monetary donations since 2012, these projects wouldn't have been possible. The projects are:

- New organ \$18,565
- Replaced the HVAC in the sanctuary and office wing \$125.083
- New lights in the sanctuary \$17,374
- New flat roof over the sanctuary 3,405
- AED (Automated External Defibrillator) for the sanctuary \$1,199—funded entirely through grant from Vermilion Healthcare Foundation
- Parsonage:
 - o New HVAC \$6,650
 - o New roof \$7,755
 - o Attic insulation \$1,745
 - o Electrical work \$1,321
 - Crawlspace insulation and vapor barrier

- o Asphalt driveway \$7,525
- Kitchen cabinets, master bath shower, sliding glass door \$9,920
- o New flooring in some rooms of parsonage \$5,011
- Partial payment towards new playground equipment (from Hog Roast proceeds) \$4,149
- Paid down and provided monthly payments for the church mortgage \$104,735
- New cafeteria stoves/ovens \$9,562
- Drainage tile around building and parsonage \$21,235
- South portion of parking lot resealed and restriped \$8,960
- Replacing school wing windows \$113,329 (\$10,000 was received from Cadle grant and \$8,100 from bequests account)
- Guttering on school wing \$13,835
- Resurfacing gym floor \$2,500
- New lighting for driveway \$22,168
- New guttering over the chapel door \$195
- New guttering and downspouts for the sanctuary \$4.900
- Resealing and striping of the north portion of the parking lot \$14,277

ROOF DRIVE: The school and gym roof needs to be replaced and will cost \$259,000. The Capital Fund Committee is making this our next project with help from the Board of Directors and/or church auxiliary organizations. The fundraising will take a couple of years to get the dollars needed. There is a display in the narthex just to the north of the sanctuary doors; please stop by and look at it. The display shows the deterioration of the roof surfaces and a fundraising thermometer which will show our progress towards the goal of \$260,000.

Stewardship Repenting of "Yours" and "Mine" - Retailers
have had their Christmas displays
up since before Reformation

Sunday. The kids have made their list and checked it twice, or three times or more. It won't be long before the tree will start shedding its needles, the stockings emptied, the gifts unwrapped, toys broken, and the too small or out of style clothes returned. Before we know it, the annual celebration of Christmas will be over. But for the children of God, we know that the gift of Christmas doesn't ever end. Week in and week out, the Lord continues to shower His gifts on us. Every time the Lord gathers us to His house, and we are led to kneel at His table, the gift of forgiveness is repeatedly granted to us. It is nothing we deserve. It comes to us freely! The fourth stanza of the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us Lord for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788) highlights both this gift and our response. Teach us, O Lord, true thankfulness divine, that gives as Christ gave. never counting cost. To learn thankfulness is necessary. The parents of young children are well-versed in the fact that they must teach their children thankfulness. It does not come naturally. The spiritual genetics inherited from our parents allow us to think that the world revolves around us. When we receive something, there is an inward desire to think that we in some way deserve it. But there is no way that we deserve anything we get from our Lord. We need that ongoing lesson from God Himself. Thankfulness toward God is worked in us by the Holy Spirit. God's Word works this thanksgiving in us. We need this weekly reminder that Jesus didn't consider "equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied Himself" for us, to the point of death on a cross (Phil. 2:6). He didn't bat an eye. He paid the price! Our life of stewardship is one of daily and weekly thanksgiving inspired by the Lord Himself. That knows no barrier of "yours" and "mine," assured that only what's withheld is lost. Because Jesus gave us everything and more, there can be no ownership. The child at Christmas is quick to claim that the newly gifted toy is "mine!" But as Psalm 24:1 asserts, "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein." There isn't anything in creation that is ours. When we cling to and claim ownership of anything in creation, we are losing out on the continual gifts with which the Lord desires to shower upon us. Closed hands cannot receive anything new. We cling to the old and dead and miss the new thing that the Lord desires to do in and for us. We are led to repent of the "vours" and "mine" and remove the lie that we have any ownership. In this we have the promise that God will continue to give to us. Not just at Christmas, but every Sunday at the altar in the Lord's house.

THE INCARNATION: At the center of Christmas is Jesus, both fully God and fully man. "In Bethlehem, humility and glory in their extremes were joined," wrote pastor R.G. Lee (1886-1978). When Jesus came to earth, Lee explained, he descended:

- from the heights of glory to the depths of shame,
- from the wonders of heaven to the wickedness of earth,
- from exaltation to humiliation,
- from the throne to the tree,
- from dignity to debasement,
- from worship to wrath.

- from the halls of heaven to the nails of earth,
- from the coronation to the curse,
- from the glory place to the gory place!

"Born in a stable! Cradled in a cattle trough! Wrapped in swaddling clothes of poverty!" Lee wrote. "No room for him who made all rooms! [No] place for him who made and knows all places! Oh, deep humiliation of the Creator — born of the creature, woman! But in his descent was the dawn of mercy. Because we cannot ascend to him, he descends to us."

When my spiritual vision is foggy, help me to find my way.

When my understanding is incomplete, open my mind and increase my patience.

When my indifference blocks my senses, touch my heart.

When worry or fear raise their voices, speak to my faith.

Let your Spirit permeate my longings as well as my living and my loving. Amen.


