THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD

The fourth Wednesday of our advent series was meant to be Jesus is the Light. This is something that is commonly heard in the church and this is the theme that was to be the fourth Wednesday in Advent's theme. This year though, there were only three Wednesdays in advent, with Christmas Eve falling on that fourth Wednesday. Our Christmas Eve Sermon touched on this theme, but not everyone was able to be with us on Christmas Eve, as many of us travel to be with our families for Christmas. This is good. I always did when I was a child and would travel from my home in the Detroit area down I-94W or I-96W, always a great debate on which way to go, before hopping on I-69S and the various little roads to get to Logansport, IN to spend Christmas at grandma's. So let us look at Jesus, Light of the World.

Light is a common theme in the Old Testament. The first day God said "Let the be light" and separated the light from the darkness (Gen 1:4) and in the Gospels, especially in the gospel of John. John's Gospel account opens with a retelling of creation and the fall, and with great metaphor, "And the word became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14) which was our Advent theme, but John also speaks much of light in his opening verses, as John sets the scene for his Gospel account. Not only does he speak of the word becoming flesh but he also speaks of life and light (John 1:5). The truth being the light entering into the darkness, into the world, and the darkness not overcoming it (John 1:5).

John the apostle speaks of John the Baptist as not being the light but pointing to it (John 1:8). He makes clear that Jesus is the light of the world and in John 1:12). Clearly John puts a great emphasis on Jesus as the Light. Even later in his Gospel Jesus, Himself, states that HE is the way, the truth, and the light (John 14:6).

In today's world, we tend to understand light as good and darkness as bad. Just think back on the multiple light projects we have done at Immanuel in the past few years. More security light outside, replacing the parking lot lights and then the driveway lights. Don't forget the indoor lighting project at the church and school. I have never heard anyone suggest we make it darker in the building or on the property.

In John's time some misunderstood light and darkness. Some saw them as equal. This is why John made sure to write "and the darkness did not overcome it" (John 1:5) letting us know in the beginning of His Gospel that Jesus, the light of the world, has won the battle and by stating so foreshadowing the epic battle on the cross through which the darkness was vanquished and morning came through Christ's Easter resurrection. Come into the light, and Let the light of Christ within you aching into rhea Seek world this New Year.

In our sanctuary we have many light so that we can gather to hear the word of god preached and spoken to us. With our projectors and screens light has become even more a part of our worship. We hope and pray that our congregation, that Immanuel, God with us, may be both a city on a hill, visible to the community around us, and a light, a place where Christ shines forth. As we enter the New Year and make resolutions may we take time to ponder how we can be better lights of Jesus in the world? Redeemed and saved by grace and now living in His spirit and shining for His light. Amen.


STEWARDSHIP SPOT

Repenting of "Feasts that Know No Fast" - Fresh off the Christmas season and the retail frenzy that accompanies it, January brings a shot of frigid air into the lives of the people we know and love. This is not a meteorological statement either. While it is true that January is one of the colder months for those in North America, the cold front blast that hits us is the full force of credit card spending that fueled the retail frenzy. The bills have now come due. The credit card makes things convenient, but it also requires more discipline than many can muster. When the bills come in, it really puts a damper on things. Congregations often make the same mistake in stewardship. We often charge forward in doing what we always do or starting new endeavors without counting the cost. But at the end of the month, or the end of year, when the bill comes due, the red ink on the congregational balance sheet smacks the people in the face like a stiff north wind in January. We start to panic. The work of the Gospel suffers. The fifth verse of "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788) addresses this January situation. The words penned by William Watkins Reid are very needful for us to hear as we start a new year, while dealing with the bills of past efforts and expense. "Forgive us, Lord for feast that knows not fast ..." This hits us hard, doesn't it? We love when the money is flowing, the parties are going, and things are getting bigger and better. But there is a time in life, and most especially in our spiritual disciplines, that we need to fast. The purpose of a fast is to step back, lay something aside for a time, and replace it with meditation on Scripture and prayer. This is designed to keep us from turning something that may well be good into an idol that separates us from the God who loves us in Christ. "For joy in things that meanwhile starve the soul ..." In "The Parable of the Sower," we hear Jesus talk about how the worries of life choke out the growth of the seed of the Word that was planted. We know how this happens in our lives. Professional and youth sports do this. Materialism does this. Travel and leisure and do this. There is a list of things that we enjoy that starve the soul. But it also happens in our congregations. When corporate stewardship is not managed in a responsible way, it can and does destroy individual stewardship. Is it good individual stewardship to support a ministry that doesn't take its corporate responsibility seriously? "For walls and wars that hide your mercies vast and blur our vision of the Kingdom goal." This is the ultimate end of the idolatry of failed stewardship. We build walls between believers within the church and hamper those who are outside from coming to the Light of Life that is Jesus. The wars we fight over money and its impact on ministry do the same. It eventually blurs our vision of what we are here to do: share the Good News of Jesus. When the wintry blast of January hits us in this fashion, we are called to repent. When the Holy Spirit uses the cold front of the call to repentance, we meet the God who forgives and restores. That is what He does for individual and corporate stewards. When the bills hit, they call us back to Jesus. He is the One who indeed forgives us our shallow thankfulness and leads us into the bounty of His mercy yet again.



NYG 2025: Six and a half months to go before the youth go to New Orleans for the National Youth Gathering - we are getting so excited! ALL ABOUT ATTITUDE: "The way you say 'representative' to an automated system reflects the real you," a friend told me. After we laughed at that truth, I realized everything I say matters. Someone is always listening, whether the words and tone are positive or negative. Ephesians 4:29 (NLT) says our language shouldn't be "foul or abusive" but good, helpful and encouraging. Whether I'm peaceful, hurried, joyful, empathetic, frustrated, celebrating or hurting, I can carefully choose my words (and the attitude behind them). When I'm not ready to speak wholesomely, may God shut my mouth. When a friend needs encouragement, may I listen to God's prompting. When I need to confront, may I do so lovingly. Changing how we think — that is, how we speak to ourselves — can be tough. But God wants to transform our reactions and motives, dispelling pride, a lack of confidence and anxiety. In this new year:

- I'm alone can become God is with me.
- I can't do this can become Anything is possible with God.
- I'm failing can become Just because I'm struggling, it doesn't mean I'm failing.
- I'm not enough can become I'm God's beloved child.
- I'm tired can become God will give me rest.

Don't stop there. Consider the concerns in your heart and let God give you new words and attitudes.

GIFT (SCRIP) CARDS ORDERS: The next Scrip order is due to the church office on Monday, Jan. 13 by 9 am. Scrip cards make great gifts! Updated order blanks are on the table in the chapel hallway. Orders are not limited to the vendors listed on the order blank. You can find a complete list of vendors at www.raiseright.com or on the bulletin board in the hall. Write the name of the vendor, denomination of the gift card, number of cards wanted, and total amount on a blank line. Orders will be available on Jan. 19. What is Scrip? They are gift cards. If you order and pay for a \$100 Meijer scrip card, you get a \$100 Meijer gift card. The church gets \$3 (3%) from the program, and you buy \$100 worth of groceries, prescriptions, gas, etc. with it. There are varying rates depending on the vendor ranging from 1.5% to 13%. These cards are good anywhere and make great birthday, Christmas, new baby, or wedding gifts.

CAPITAL FUND DRIVE: The current bank balance is \$3,014 with \$65,000 in Certificates of Deposit making our total monetary balance \$68,014. Our current project is the reroofing of the flat roofs of the school/gym wing of our building. This project will total approximately \$260,000 and fundraising should be done by the end of 2025 since the current roof has already outlasted its lifespan. We are going to apply for a couple of grants to help pay for this project, but we still need the donations of our congregation to be able to fund this project. Donations do not have to be one large amount; they can be smaller monthly or quarterly donations-whatever fits your budget. The congregation established the Capital Fund Drive in 2012, and thanks to our generous congregation, we have accomplished many needed upgrades/renovations. Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own household's. There is a Capital Fund Drive bulletin board in the hallway between the coat room and the parish mailboxes, where you'll find special envelopes for ongoing donations throughout the year. - Paintbrush
- Darning needle
- Fishing twine
- Scissors
- Googly eyes or buttons

Glue What you do:


- 1. From the egg carton, cut out the 12 cups. From the lid, cut out two fish tails.
- 2. On a protected surface, turn the cups upside down. Paint the outside of each cup and both sides of the tails. Let dry.
- 3. Thread the needle with an arm's length of twine. Tie a knot at the end.
- 4. Thread the needle through the end of the tail. Tie another knot an inch from the tail.
- 5. Thread the needle through one upside-down cup. Pull the twine through until the cup rests on the knot.
- 6. Continue tying knots an inch above each cup and threading on another cup until you've strung six cups. Tie a knot above the last cup and leave a long string to hang the fish. (You can make two fish with each egg carton.)
- 7. Add googly eyes or buttons to the last cup to make a face.


