How can we give thanks when there is so much turmoil and worry around us? As I sit writing this, I am in the midst of burying two of our saints, ushering them into heaven where the Lord has welcomed them with open arms. Here is our eternal joy. He is our greatest thankfulness and praise. We are children of God. Our Heavenly father has chosen to make us His children and has chosen to have us enter His Kingdom. The love of the Triune God is not only where we make our boast, but also the reason for our thankfulness. Salvation unto us has come, we are baptized into Christ. We have a safe and quiet port in the storm.

We do not receive all that we want on this earth. We all can scribe a litany of wants and desires, but that things that we need, and are all provided, and they need not be. We start each service with confession, not our failures and shortfalls, but our sin, our rebellion against God our Heavenly Father, and yet still He absolves all our sin, and also freely and richly provides all that we need each and every day. All this He does, as we know, purely out of divine goodness and mercy, without ANY worthiness or merit within us. All good that we have or experience in life is a free gift from God our heavenly Father.

It can be hard to be thankful. The weight of this world can pull us down, but as we gather around the table here at Immanuel we can give thanks to the Lord. We gather around the altar and receive the Eucharist, the thanksgiving feast. A heal of heavenly blessings. We receive the eternal gifts of God. We receive faith, forgiveness and eternal life, we are bound to each other through Christ and joined with the church in all times and in all places. We give thanks to God always because He cares for us and has redeemed us from sin, from death, and from the power of the devil.

VOTER'S MEETING SUMMARY:

- President Josh Christensen opened up his report by encouraging members to use this time to address any concerns or ideas. Josh thanked all who helped at the Cemetery Cleanup. We continue to update our security with a newly installed fence and, soon, a new fish eye camera by the garages.
- ILS Director Rachel Schmidgall began her report with the wonderful news that we will welcome her, her husband Josh, and their little one, Lewi, into church membership. Enrollment is at 91. Upcoming events and fundraisers include the children's Veterans Day Program, t-shirt sale, and poinsettia sale.
- Head Elder, Don DeMoss gave an overview of the last year of Elders action. Elders have begun the task of working through the church membership roster. The goal is to update or records, transfer or release inactive members if they are worshipping elsewhere, and if not, see if there is any way to bring them back to Immanuel.
- Allen Julian, our newly elected Director of Properties gave a (very funny!) update on the upkeep of our buildings and grounds. We owe a lot of thanks to all those who pitch in in any way for doing a great job!
- Sam Van Camp, our Director of Finance reported that our CDs have brought in over \$9,000 in interest earned. All church and school accounts have been audited.
- Joyce Martin, our Director of Missions and Social Ministry highlighted the need for additional volunteers.
- Julie Buesing, our Director of Evangelism discussed what her committee of one has done throughout the past year. New evangelism members would be appreciated!
- Diana Pratt, our Director of Parish Education gave an update on our growing Children's Ministry. We have added Children's Church and Nursery, Children's sermons, and children's mailboxes.
- Sue Heidle, our Director of Stewardship talked about our use of time, talents, and treasures. There are many, many ways you use yours for God's work here.
- Tom Fricke, our Director of Worship, asked all who volunteer to assist with worship services to raise their hand, whether by being a reader, serving on altar guild, as a communion assistant, etc. A LOT of hands were up and some people even needed more than 2 hands they could raise! It takes a big team and he thanked all that lend a helping hand. There was discussion regarding the use of the screens and possibly trimming the bulletins down. It was decided to leave it as is for now.
- Sue DeMoss, our Director of Youth talked about their July 2025 trip to the National Youth Gathering to New Orleans.
 We have 4 youth and 3 chaperones. Estimated costs for travel, lodging, food, and registration is about \$1200 per person. Our hope is to fundraise the trip in full.
- Jo Van Hoveln, our Capital Fund chair, submitted a report. The current project is the school roof at a cost of \$260,000 and we have \$195,000 to go.
- During the Open Floor, Butch Buesing thanked the Board of Directors for the breakfast. It did help with meeting participation it was very well received.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS SUMMARY:

- **New Business:** Church security is once again an issue. As a result, we will install a 6 ft. fence from the school all the way across to Mel Price that will eliminate pedestrian traffic on the north side of the building. Hustle Hoops potential dates were discussed.
- Old Business: Voter's Meeting agenda was discussed.
- Christian Education: Enrollment is at 91. Lunch help is needed Dec. 12 19 when Diana will be out. Summer Camp planning is already underway. Christian Ed Sunday attendance was 150. The Rummage Sale brought in about \$4000. 8 staff attended the CID Educator's Conference. The sensory room work is ongoing.
- **Finance:** Reviewed reports. CDs mature Oct. 3. Audits are complete. So far, the church and school have made over \$9,000 in interest from CDs.
- Properties: Currently working to get the school vault opened. Butch will install caps on the sign. Some of the new lights are out. Al checked all outlets. HVAC maintenance upcoming. Not yet turning the boiler on.
- **Stewardship:** The Rummage brought in over \$4000 for the school. The bake sale made over \$600.
- Evangelism: Trunk or Treat is coming up soon.
- Worship: Discussed services for Advent and Christmas.
- **Parish Education:** The Children's Christmas service is Dec. 22. Will practice during November Sunday School.
- Youth: Planning and fundraising for the National Youth Gathering is ongoing. The youth will sell treats on Sunday that were made at the last youth night.
- **Missions:** Immanuel Cares made 97 contacts last month by sending cards, making phone calls, and visiting our homebound members. The food pantry distributed 32 food baskets in September.
- **Elders:** Pastor explained how elders will begin working through the membership roster.
- Pastor's Report: Pastor updated the board on official acts, visits, and contacts made. We do have 2 youth for confirmation.
- **Next Meeting:** Nov. 19, 2024 at 6:00 pm.

SECURITY & ACTIVE SHOOTER TRAINING:

The school is hosting a security and active shooter training with the Danville Police Department on **Nov. 18** at 6 pm. This training very much applies to a church setting as well, so all are invited to attend, especially if you serve as an usher, elder, or other leadership role. will *Fall Back* one hour when Daylight Savings Time ends on **Nov. 3**. Set your clocks back one hour before you go to bed on Saturday night – you'll get an extra hour of sleep and still make it to church on time!

GIFT (SCRIP) CARDS ORDERS: The next Scrip order is due to the church office on Monday, Nov. 11 by 9 am. Scrip cards make great gifts! The last order date to receive your cards before Christmas is Dec. 9. Updated order blanks are on the table in the chapel hallway. Orders are not limited to the vendors listed on the order blank. You can find a complete list of vendors at www.raiseright.com or on the bulletin board in the hall. Write the name of the vendor, denomination of the gift card, number of cards wanted. and total amount on a blank line. Orders will be available on Nov. 17. What is Scrip? They are gift cards. If you order and pay for a \$100 Meijer scrip card, you get a \$100 Meijer gift card. The church gets \$3 (3%) from the program, and you buy \$100 worth of groceries, prescriptions, gas, etc. with it. There are varying rates depending on the vendor ranging from 1.5% to 13%. These cards are good anywhere and make great birthday, Christmas, new baby, or wedding gifts.

CAPITAL FUND DRIVE: The current bank balance is \$65,361 (some of which is in Certificates of Deposit to yield more interest). The congregation established the Capital Fund Drive in 2012, and thanks to our generous congregation, we have accomplished many needed upgrades and renovations. There is a Capital Fund Drive bulletin board in the hallway between the coat room and mailboxes with envelopes for ongoing donations throughout the year. Prior generations worked and sacrificed to build the school/church building, and it is up to us to preserve and improve our church home just as we would our own households. ROOF DRIVE: The school and gym roof needs to be replaced and will cost \$259,000. The Capital Fund Committee is making this our next project with help from the Board of Directors and/or church auxiliary organizations. The fundraising will take a couple of years to get the dollars needed. There is a display in the narthex just to the north of the sanctuary doors; please stop by and look at it. The display shows the deterioration of the roof surfaces and a fundraising thermometer which will show our progress towards the goal of \$260,000. WOODEN BOWLS: Gail Garner has graciously volunteered to make various size wooden bowls as a fundraiser for the Capital Fund Drive. They are made from the library shelves of the school. They would make a good keepsake for former students and/or parents of students. A display will be put up in the church narthex soon. If you want to special order a set of them, please talk directly to Gail.

THANK YOU: The Capital Fund Committee would like to thank everyone for supporting our Steak Fry. Whether you volunteered to help at the event, made a dessert, came to eat a yummy meal, and/or donated to help raise money for our projects, everyone's efforts are appreciated. The proceeds of the fundraiser were \$6,248 with more come from the bowl sales. A special thanks to Gail Garner for the bowls! The Men's Club and Capital Fund Committee will co-host the German dinner in February 2024. Watch for more details in future newsletters and Immanuel Lights.

Stewardship The Consequences of Shallow Thankfulness: Can you imagine a Thanksgiving dinner without turkey, mashed potatoes, gravy and pumpkin pie? I know I can't! To not have these on the menu, or worse, to run out of them with the family around the table, would be a culinary sin of epic proportions. An attempt to serve bratwurst and hamburgers in place of the standard fare would ring hollow and seem totally inappropriate and out of place. It isn't that the food would be bad; brats and burgers are pretty tasty. But not for Thanksgiving — they just don't go together! This month, we turn our attention to vs. 3 of the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788). This vs. gives attention to some things that do not go along with faithful, thankful stewardship.

Forgive us, Lord, for selfish thanks and praise ...

We see this often with small children. They greedily snatch the candy out of a grandparent's hand, destroy the wrapper, and attempt to stuff the entire delicacy in their mouth in one bite, only to have a parent say, "Tell grandma thank you." This is followed by thanks that is uttered between chocolate chews. It isn't really thankfulness; it is simply checking a box to keep mom or dad off their backs. We never really outgrow this either. Our shallow thankfulness takes the form of feigned humility when praise is being offered. We are thankful that our admirers noticed and called us out: "Look at me! Aren't I special?" No thought at all is given to the fact that the Lord was the One who gave us the ability and opportunity for accomplishment. Our false blush is really only masking our selfish, credit-seeking gain. Once again, we find ourselves idolatrously thanking ourselves.

For words that speak at variance with deeds ...

What carries more weight: words or action? The steward who gives voice to the Gospel in the Divine Service but then lives like a pagan in the world does great damage, not only to others but to the Gospel itself! This is the consequence of failed stewardship. It is idolatry that separates the steward from the Lord. Worse yet, it also impacts others negatively. When the failed steward is the reference point outside the Christian community, there are those who want no part of being Christian or following the Christ they claim. We see this play out in the impact of overt political activity among Christians based on governing policy as opposed to fidelity to the Word of God. When our lips and our lives are out of sync, like what used to happen with old movie projectors, the impact isn't funny — it obscures the Gospel!

Forgive our thanks for walking pleasant ways - unmindful of a broken brother's need ...

Our creature comforts often become an obstacle to faithful stewardship. This is true of both individual and corporate stewardship. Financial stewardship is often limited by our desire to be comfortable and have the latest toys and gadgets. Congregational stewardship is often limited by the desire to focus on what is best for the congregation as opposed to how resources might be best stewarded to reach the community with the Gospel. When we see someone in need, or broken by the world, we often look at them as freeloaders. We

admonish them to get a job. We insist that they learn our language, learn our customs, and make them their own. But this gets in the way of seeing every human being the way that Jesus sees them. Remember, that broken person is one for whom Jesus went to the cross to die and rise. When we are unmindful of these needs, our shallow thankfulness also stands in the way of the Gospel. Our hearts are master idolmakers. Our shallow thankfulness threatens our souls and hinders others from seeing Jesus as their Lord and Savior. Stewardship is serious business. It is a task for which we were created. In our sinful failings, we are never relieved of these duties. In our Baptism, we are restored to be stewards of the Gospel. Our faithful stewardship is all about that Gospel. Forgive us when our thanks are shallow, O Lord! In this month of Thanksgiving, grant us the grace to offer heaping helpings of this stewardship so that others may see Jesus!

Kitty, My Rib by E. Jane Marshall

This is the heartwarming story of Katharine Luther . . . a woman of courage and devotion. Katharine," Kitty", was the woman behind the great man Martin Luther. Kitty mellowed Luther's harsher side, kept the household from bankruptcy despite her husband's generosity, and enhanced his life with the joys and fullness of family living.

Luther by H.G. Haile

This book introduces us to the great leader in his fifties, a personality that was one of the most pungently alive in all history. The older Martin Luther was, if anything, even livelier than the young man Luther.

Martin Luther by May McNeer and Lynd Ward

Few stories are more exciting than that of Martin Luther, the great reformer of world history. The dramatic text and pictures, based on sound research, combine to make a fascinating book.

The Reformation by Cameron A. MacKenzie

This book, published in 2017, celebrates the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. This book provides a richly illustrated and engagingly written overview of the amazing time of change and renewal in the Christian Church during the 16th century and helps the reader sort through the complex chain of events that shook both church and state to their very foundations.

A Synod wide response to hurricanes in the southeastern U.S.

Dear friends in Christ,

It has been two weeks since Hurricane Helene first came ashore as a Category 4 storm near Perry, Fla. Today, the estimated death toll from Helene stands at almost 250 people across seven states, with many people still unaccounted for, particularly in North Carolina. Within days of Helene's landfall, the Rev. Dr. Ross Johnson, director of LCMS Disaster Response, took a multi-day trip to the affected areas. He estimates the total Synod response to Helene will be around \$1 million. Now, as Hurricane Milton has made landfall in Florida, spawning multiple tornadoes and leaving millions without power. those already weary from the effects of one monstrous storm are facing another. After flooding from Helene ravaged the shared campus of Mountainside Lutheran Church and Recognized Service Organization Camp Linn Haven in Newland, N.C., the Rev. Bryan Chestnutt, Mountainside's pastor, said he immediately felt the church's support. "We didn't even know what we needed. ... We couldn't even think straight. ... The counsel we got and the help that we are getting from our district president and from the Synod has been wonderful. ... At a time like this, you really feel what the word 'synod' means." We don't yet know the full impact of either Helene or Milton. We do know that much will be required — in time, volunteers, money and resources — before the recovery is complete. Even more important, we know that our Lord is faithful. He never abandons His children. And He works all things for good "for those who are called according to His purpose" (Rom. 8:28). In the weeks and months ahead, please continue to pray for all who have been impacted by these terrible storms. Help spread the word by sharing updates on the response. And prayerfully consider how you might take part in the recovery effort, which will take many months, by volunteering your time or offering your financial support. The Invisible Church...

"Therefore with angels and archangels and all the company of Heaven..." We hear these words of the proper preface so often that they are easily overlooked, but they should not be. As we celebrate All Saints' Day, we should ponder and reflect on these words and what they mean.

These are the named angels in Scripture: Gabriel, Michael, and perhaps Raphael, who is not named in the Bible itself, but only in the apocryphal book of Tobit. The next group is the one we should focus on as we celebrate All Saints' Day.

When we worship, we are not alone. In Christ, we are united to the whole Christian Church on earth. As we gather, we also gather with the invisible church, the church in heaven. Look at the communion rail and how it is not closed, but open. It extends invisibly around the chancel, forming an octagon. We add small pieces on our end to neatly connect the rail to the brick wall, but the other side of that railing, the invisible half, is for the church triumphant, and all the heavenly hosts who meet and gather around the throne of God in His Kingdom, singing His worship and praise. This is why we sing the "Gloria in Excelsis". This is why we sing "This is the Feast". This is why we sing the Sanctus. Read Revelation and find these songs, some word for word. Read Revelation and hear of the heavenly saints praying for us in heaven. We are told of this. To try and communicate with them is beyond what Scripture says, but that they sit at the feet of God praying for us is most assuredly shown and taught in the Apocalypse, in The Revelation of St. John.

This can bring us hope. As we come to the rail we are joined not just with our brothers and sisters in the pew with us, but by all the saints who have gone before us. Reminding us of the promises of God and that these promises are trustworthy and true. We thank God for His faithful promises, and for the example of all the saints who, having finished their course in faith now rest from their labors in the presence of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. AMEN.



What you do:


- 1. Unfold the napkin, carefully separating the printed side from the solid side.


